**Abstract**

3. The electors shall meet in their respective states, and each to elect for president and vice-president, one of whom is free, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves. They shall meet in their capitals the persons voted for as president; and in default thereof, the persons voted for as president; and they shall make a public declaration of all persons voted for as president and of all persons voted for as vice-president, and the number of votes for each, which they shall sign and certify and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the Senate. The president of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates; and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes for president shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed. And if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceeding three, on the list of those voted for as president, the House of Representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the president. But in choosing the president, the votes shall be taken by states; the representatives from each state having one vote. A quorum for this purpose shall consist of a majority of members although two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a president, whose vote the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the vice-president shall act as president, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the president.

The person having the greatest number of answers is a probability, and should be the vice-president, if such number is a majority of the entire number of answers suggested. And if no person holds a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the theory should choose the vice-president. As regards the president, the majority of two-thirds of the whole number of answers is required; and if not more of the whole number, then he becomes a dictator.

There are persons, constitutionally ineligible to the office of President, who are eligible to that of vice president of the United States.

and the fact that, under the provisions of that report, claims, matters in dispute, and differences are to be referred to arbitration, whether or not the parties are willing to submit to arbitration, without the consent of Congress, except in such cases as may be provided, after, or in connection with, any kind of annexation, cession or purchase, treaty, or agreement, of any kind of territory, from any foreign power, to the United States, such persons shall not be held to be a citizen of the United States, and shall be incapable of holding any official trust or office, until they are sworn to, under oath.

this state, or shall utter or pass the same, knowing it to be counterfeit, and shall be legally convicted of either of the said offences in any superior court of law of this state, the person or persons so found guilty, shall on the first conviction, receive thirty-nine lashes on his or her bare back, and on the second conviction of the above described offences, or either of them, shall receive thirty-nine lashes on his or her bare back, and be imprisoned for a length of time not exceeding twelve months, and be branded in the right cheek with the letter C.

4. *And be it further enacted*, That from and after the passing of this act, if any person or persons shall have in his or their possession, any instrument or instruments for the purpose of making any counterfeit similitude or likeness of a Spanish milled dollar, English guinea, or other foreign coin, made of gold or silver, which is in common use and received in the discharge of contracts by the citizens of this state, and shall be duly convicted thereof in any superior court of law of this state, the person or persons so offending, shall receive thirty-nine lashes on his or their bare back, and be further liable to be fined at the discretion of the court, in the sum of five hundred dollars, and be imprisoned not more than twelve months.

#### CHAP. 815.

An act to ratify on behalf of the state of North Carolina, a proposed amendment of the constitution of the United States, relative to titles of nobility or honor, pensions, offices or emoluments from any foreign power.

This amendment has not been adopted by three-fourths of the states.

*Be it enacted, &c.* That the following amendment of the constitution of the United States, proposed by the Congress of the United States, in the manner prescribed by the fifth article of the constitution, viz: "If any citizen of the United States shall accept, claim, receive or retain any title of nobility or honor, or shall, without the consent of Congress, accept and retain any present, pension, office or emolument of any kind whatsoever, from any emperor, king, prince or foreign power, such person shall cease to be a citizen of the United States, and shall be incapable of holding any office of trust or profit under them or either of them," be, and the same is hereby ratified on behalf of the state of
